The Authority and Purpose of the Illinois Long Term Care Council

The Illinois Long Term Care Council (Council) was created in August 2003 by Public Act 93-0498, which added Section 4.04a of the Illinois Act on the Aging (Act) (20 ILCS 105/4.04a).

The purpose of the Council is to ensure high quality of care for persons aged 60 or older who need long-term care in the continuum of care – from home care to nursing home care. The Council provides a forum for making recommendations on systemic issues affecting the continuum of long-term care, and the efficacy of the State Long Term Care Ombudsman Program.

The Council makes recommendations concerning persons who need services in the continuum of long-term care. This includes persons living in facilities licensed or regulated under the:

- (1) Nursing Home Care Act: Skilled Nursing and Intermediate Care Facilities Code, Intermediate Care for Persons with Developmental Disabilities Code, Sheltered Care Facilities Code, and Illinois Veterans Homes Code
- (2) Assisted Living and Shared Housing Establishment Code
- (3) Community services including Supportive Living Facilities, regulated under the Illinois Department of Health Care and Family Services through a federal waiver (89 Ill. Adm. Code Part 146), Adult Day Care and any other type of long-term care provided in a home or other environment

Council Mandates

Mandate I. Make recommendations and comment on issues pertaining to long-term care and the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program to the Illinois Department on Aging (Department).

Mandate II. Advise the Department of Public Health and the Department on Aging matters pertaining to the quality of life and quality of care in the continuum of long-term care.

Mandate III. Evaluate, comment on reports regarding, and make recommendations on the quality of life and quality of care in long-term care facilities and on the duties and responsibilities of the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program.

Mandate IV. Provide an opportunity for public input at each scheduled meeting.

Legislative Updates from the Office of the Long-Term Care Ombudsman

Listed below are the legislative initiatives proposed by the Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program which were passed during the 104th General Assembly.

HB4517 Amends the Authorized Electronic Monitoring in Long-Term Care Facilities Act ([210 ILCS 32](#)) to expand coverage to assisted living and shared housing establishments. "Electronic monitoring device" means a surveillance instrument with a fixed position video camera or an audio recording device, or a combination thereof, that is installed in a resident's room under the provisions of this Act and broadcasts or records activity or sounds occurring in the room.

HB4700 Amends the Abused and Neglected Long Term Care Facility Residents Reporting Act ([210 ILCS 30](#)) to include assisted living and shared housing establishments in the definition of long term care facility. Also amends the Adult Protective Service Act to remove facilities operating within the supportive living program from the list of homes excluded in the definition of “domestic living situation.”

HB5047 Amends the Assisted Living and Shared Housing Act ([210 ILCS 9](#)), the ID/DD Community Care Act ([210 ILCS 47](#)), and the MC/DD Act ([210 ILCS 46](#)) to include the Long-Term Care Ombudsman in the list of individuals receiving notification when an establishment or facility intends to voluntarily close.

New Member Recruitment

Over the last several years, the Council lost members due to resignations, term limitations, and the lingering impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Rebuilding the membership continues to be an ongoing focus. The Department will continue to work on securing new members to ensure the Council is comprised of the diverse background envisioned by the Act. During this reporting period, we were able to add two new residents to the Council.

2026 Council Goals On-Going

The Council discussed several goals for the year and developed a survey to rank the goals in order of priority. We are still working through these goals with the Council. During the 2026 reporting year, we discuss strategies for advocating for person centered care. We also asked for recommendations for legislative initiatives for the 2027 legislative session. The goals in their order of priority are listed below:

1. Pursue required training for CNAs focusing on compassion and empathy towards long-term care residents and the aging population
2. Advocate for person-centered care in long-term care facilities
3. Discuss and propose legislative solutions from problems identified in long-term care facilities
