As we <u>celebrate Pride</u>, we must remember that there would be no Pride Month if it wasn't for the efforts of the LGBTQ elders who fought against unfair laws and treatment.

Donald Bell, 73, a co-chair of the Illinois Commission on LGBTQ Aging, has a long history of activism. As someone who lives at the intersection of several social demographics, Bell first became involved in the fight for racial justice as a high school student. In college, he delved into issues of sexual orientation and gender identity, while recognizing the dangers of being outed at the time: "Our lives were at risk, not only socially, they were physically at risk. Gay bashing was certainly a norm of the times, just as lynching was a norm of the times still...Activism was not a part of trying to be cool, activism was a part of survival."

Half a century later, it's still about survival for Bell, who is involved in an advocacy campaign with other residents of the LGBTQ-friendly Town Hall Apartments, after <u>building managers</u> <u>removed their security services</u> with only a few days' notice.

Whether it's about the safety of his own geographic community or the LGBTQ community, Bell feels compelled to work toward improving the lives of others like himself. These sentiments are shared by Billy Rogers, co-founder of the LGBTQ advocacy group <u>Golden Rainbows of Illinois South</u>, and who is also the first person to serve as the Illinois Commission on LGBTQ Aging's LGBTQ Older Adult Advocate.

Like Bell, Rogers was selected by Gov. JB Pritzker to serve on the statewide commission. A resident of Du Quoin, he brings a somewhat different perspective than the Chicago-based Bell, but at the same time shares a passion for advocacy, largely fueled by his own experiences as a member of the LGBTQ community. Rogers was graciously humble throughout our interview with him, but he did acknowledge the role his generation played in paving the way for younger members of the LGBTQ community "to identify however they like. We elders honor that, and we think the youth of today is incredible...we have to honor them too."

Celebrating and honoring the LGBTQ community lasts far beyond Pride Month. And it's not all about parades and flags. Pride is about history - and the ongoing fight for equity for LGBTQ older adults.



Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month



This June, during Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month, IDoA is joining the Alzheimer's Association and the Illinois Department of Public Health to help raise awareness of Alzheimer's disease and available resources.

The IDoA Communications team recently sat down with Jessica Link, dementia coordinator for the state of Illinois, to ask her about her role, statewide efforts to support individuals living with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias (ADRD), and how each of us can get involved in the cause.

Tell us a little about yourself and your role as the statewide dementia coordinator. What are some of your primary responsibilities? What does a typical day look like for you?

I started as the first dementia coordinator with the Illinois Department of Public Health in February 2021. The position was legislatively established to implement the Alzheimer's Disease Illinois State Plan in collaboration with the Alzheimer's Disease Advisory Committee. In my role, I coordinate dementia efforts across state agencies, strengthen partnerships with community stakeholders and partners, and coordinate statewide efforts that increase awareness of dementia and access to the services and supports available for individuals living with dementia, their families, and caregivers. A typical day never looks the same—you can find me attending meetings, talking to stakeholders and partners, writing

reports, learning on national webinars, conducting grant work, and pretty much doing anything that helps Illinois to become more dementia capable. Trained as a licensed clinical social worker, I enjoy the variety of responsibilities and strive to keep health equity at the center of our programmatic activities.

I've heard that Illinois has an Alzheimer's disease plan. Who is this plan for? How is it used to increase dementia capacity in Illinois?

The Alzheimer's Disease Illinois State Plan was established in January 2014 and produced by the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) in conjunction with the Alzheimer's Disease Advisory Committee (ADAC), other state agencies, and relevant Alzheimer's disease stakeholders. The plan is for any person, community, agency, institution, or organization that has the means and interest in helping implement the recommendations. The goal is to help serve persons living with dementia and caregivers impacted by Alzheimer's disease and related dementias (ADRD), and "to guide" ADRD-related efforts within the state. The intention of the plan is to strategize approaches that are equitable, culturally, and linguistically responsive; create meaningful change; and reduce health disparities. Updates are made every three years and the current 2023-2026 Alzheimer's Disease Illinois State Plan is posted on the IDPH website.

June is Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month. What is IDPH or its partner organizations doing this month to raise awareness about Alzheimer's disease?

IDPH recently launched a quarterly e-newsletter called "The Healthy Brain Newsletter" to deliver education and information about healthy cognitive aging, ways to support brain health, and relevant community resources. Our second newsletter was released on June 12. You can sign up to receive The Healthy Brain Newsletter here! Also in June, the Alzheimer's Association will be hosting The Longest Day. People from across the world will fight the darkness of Alzheimer's disease, the most common cause of dementia, on June 21 by selecting an activity of choice and raising funds for the Alzheimer's Association. This month and beyond, how can Illinois best support those living with ADRD and their care partners? If someone I know has been newly diagnosed, are there specific resources you'd recommend?

I think awareness and kindness both go a long way in supporting those living with dementia and their care partners. There can be negative perceptions or attitudes toward people living with dementia who may be struggling with their memory or abilities in public. Illinoisans can educate themselves about <u>Alzheimer's and Related Dementias</u> so that they understand the diseases, as dementia can affect memory, thinking, and behavior. Perhaps what would be most impactful is to extend kindness, have patience, and even offer help to those you suspect may be living with dementia in your neighborhood and community. For those who have been newly diagnosed, the Alzheimer's Association has a great <u>page</u> for help and support, and a 24/7 helpline (1-800-272-3900). Get Ready to Renew Your Medicaid



Get ready to renew your Medicaid! Medicaid customers have not had to renew their Medicaid coverage since the COVID-19 pandemic began. Medicaid pays for healthcare, like doctor visits, prescription medicine, and urgent emergency services.

Now Illinois is starting renewals again to see if people are still eligible. Everybody's renewal date is different, so it is critical that you get ready to renew.

Don't risk losing your Medicaid! Here is what you need to do:

Click Manage My Case at abe.illinois.gov to:

- · Verify your mailing address under "contact us."
- Find your due date (also called redetermination date) in your "benefit details".

Watch your mail and complete your renewal right away.

If you are no longer eligible for Medicaid, connect to coverage at work or through the official Affordable Care Act marketplace for Illinois, **GetCoveredIllinois.gov**.

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day



World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, observed annually on June 15, serves as a call to action for individuals, organizations and communities to raise awareness about the abuse, neglect and exploitation of older adults. Every year, an estimated one in 10 older Americans are known victims of elder abuse, neglect or exploitation. Experts believe, however, that such abuse is significantly underreported, in part because many communities lack the social supports that would make it easier for those who experience abuse to report it. Research suggests that as few as one in 14 cases of elder abuse come to the attention of authorities.

Illinois' <u>Adult Protective Services (APS)</u> program aims to prevent and resolves instances of abuse against older adults and persons with disabilities aged 18-59 living in the community. The program is coordinated through 36 local provider agencies, whose trained caseworkers investigate allegations of abuse and connect victims with appropriate resources. During fiscal year 2022, the most recent reporting period for which data is available, the APS program received nearly 20,000 reports of suspected abuse, neglect, self-neglect, and exploitation.

Anyone can make a report of suspected abuse of an older adult or person with a disability by calling Illinois' **24-hour APS hotline at 1-866-800-1409**. For information on common types of abuse and warning signs to watch for, click here.

If you suspect **abuse or neglect of a resident living in a long-term care facility**, contact your **local ombudsman** through Illinois' **Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program**. Ombudsmen are advocates for residents of nursing homes and assisted living facilities, who work to improve residents' care and quality of life. Their services are always free and confidential.

Juneteenth



Juneteenth marks the date in 1865 when the last enslaved African Americans learned from Union soldiers in Texas that they were free, more than two years after the Emancipation Proclamation was signed.

In 2021, Governor JB Pritzker signed legislation making Juneteenth an official state holiday in Illinois.

Coming Soon: Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program Coupons

The Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program provides low-income older adults with access to locally grown fruits, vegetables, and herbs from approved farmers in Illinois. Eligible older adults can receive five \$10 vouchers (for a total value of \$50), which are redeemable for fresh produce at participating farmers' markets and farm stands in 37 Illinois counties.

Vouchers are available on a first come, first served basis, typically beginning around late June or early July. Contact your local <u>Area Agency on Aging</u> to find out when and where they are distributing the vouchers.


